

Hobstar Preview: October, 2013



22" tall Quaker City, three-part **Roosevelt** pattern cut glass revolving vase. This is the only one known to have survived, and in 1904 was more expensive than the Roosevelt 16" three-part punchbowl due to the vase sterling silver fittings.



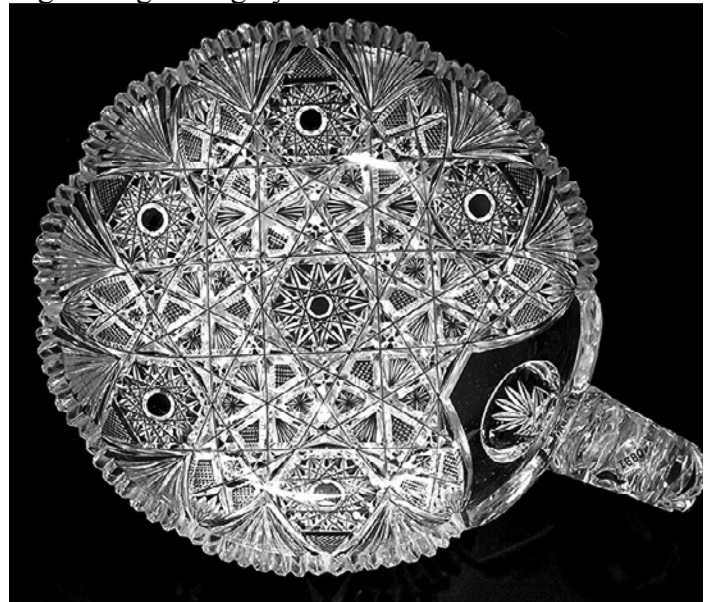
Three views of a signed Libbey Bar le Duc Jar, a bottomless mug cut in pattern No. 221 on blank No. 1067, as discussed in "**Bottomless Mugs**," by Rob Smith. A bottomless signed Libbey Cheese Jar [holder] cut in an unidentified pattern is also pictured and described.

"**Woody Auction Results, August 24, 2013**," by Fred Coveler. The \$5,000 top price was for a 10" diameter

round tray cut and signed by Hawkes in their **Lattice & Rosettes** (aka Willow) pattern. A Harvard pattern 10", two-handled, double spout decanter by Libbey with pattern matching stopper, pattern cut handles, and two matching cordial glasses sold for \$4250.



"**Topless Cut Glass Mug**," by Rob Smith describes a signed Libbey cut glass Jelly Jar, a "lidless" mug form cut in single reference pattern No. 223 on blank No. 1069. Employment of two different types of lattice cutting (fans having three vs. nine cross cuts) in a single design is highly unusual.



"**Pattern Quiz**" Bill Evans revealed that this Sept., 2013 piece is cut in Clark's "**Pointed Star**" pattern, patented in 1890. The pattern name was assigned by Revi in his book *Encyclopedia of American Cut and Engraved Glass* (2000 edition) p.242.

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
